**Past Chairperson Angie Wells filled in for Chair Andea Kuszka. She called the Teams meeting to order at 1:32pm. Susan Henry motioned to approve the agenda. Kim Meredith seconded. APPROVED.**

**Angie Wells asked for comments on the Staff Retreat held on July 20, 2021. Charlene McClain said she thought it went great and would be just as good next year. Everyone worked hard and people commented to her that the Question and Answer session at the end was wonderful. Angie Wells said that the comments she has received back were all positive. It went very well and smooth. Angie Denson said based on the evaluations, that we need to work on adding a pickle to the lunch and more snacks.**

**Lee Way added that he thought we received an excellent review. There may have been 3 comments that may be considered negative for the whole event. It was one of the better reviewed events that he**

had ever looked at. Angie Wells was pleased with the turnout and thought with all the positive reviews that next year will be even bigger and better. She noted a lot of new people through the event. Any Foster brought up that someone had said maybe a different time of year would be better but most thought the summer is still the best for most people. Lee agreed for the academic offices it is better in the summer but you need to watch SOAR days for Enrollment Management. It is hard to find a time that is good for everybody. Everyone was in agreement to do another Staff Retreat next year.

Angie Wells asked for nominations for Vice Chair and read the duties it entailed. Susan Henry nominated Sarah Stakey. Sarah respectfully declined since it was her very first meeting. Donna Schrock read the three names that were not eligible to be nominated since they would be ending their term at the end of this year; Kim Maedeth, Carrie Harris, and Susan Henry. Chalere McClain nominated Angie Wells to do another term. Corrine Johnson seconded. Unanimously Approved.

President Oldham welcomed and thanked everyone for the great job they have done in response to the pandemic. We had a little surge on campus with the Delta Variant but the numbers are coming down. We are at about half the number of cases we were two weeks ago. The numbers in the community are declining as well and encourage everyone on campus to be vaccinated. It is very easy, convenient and free to get vaccinated on campus.

There are a lot of capital improvements on campus. We have finished MacBurnett Student Recreation and Fitness Center; the new Laboratory Science Building and the Stropher Lecture Hall. The Burnett Recreation Fitness Center has been listed as one of the top ten campus recreation centers in the county. Next week we are scheduled to receive the annual Governor's Award for environmental stewardship for the new rec center and the new science building.

There was a ceremonial ground breaking for the new Engineering Building. Contractors will start work in the next few weeks. We are continuing design work on the new JJ Oakley Innovation Center and Residence Hall. The Cupola on Deryberry will be replaced with a new one in the next few weeks. Peachtree and Stadium roads on campus will get a major overhaul. Most of Peachtree will become pedestrian. The whole project will take about 18 months and will start by the end of this year or early next year. It will give a new feel to the center of campus. We are working at scheduling these projects at times that would have the least negative impact on the campus and we will keep everyone informed.

We received money in this year's appropriations to renovate Waterbarger Auditorium and the Deryberry Auditorium. We are beginning the design process now. We have submitted one capital project outlay to the state for next year for a full renovation of Johnson Hall with the conditional removal of Foster Hall. No immediate plans to replace Foster Hall on that site so it would return to greenspace.

We have big aspirations in the major areas, Research, Fundraising and Enrollment. Research had a record year with just short of \$28 million in funded research. Advancement also set a record in Fundraising over \$22 million in private gifts were given this past year.

President Oldham talked about the Wings Up Way - on how we treat our students, how we treat each other, and how we treat visitors on campus. It can be a constant reminder to treat everyone respectfully and appropriately and to roll out the red carpet. Enrollment is an issue that all universities are concerned about. Almost all universities in the state of Tennessee were down in enrollment except two. We were down about 3-4%. We are financially strong that is the good news. We have a very aggressive recruiting strategy in place going into the next recruiting cycle. We have increased scholarships, we are

guaranteeing scholarships and we have a very loud marketing campaign. We have created a student organization called the Trailblazers that provide personalized campus tours to visitors and then follow up with them to personalize the process.

We are ranked number one in Tennessee for early career salary for graduates. We are number one among public universities in Tennessee for best return on student higher education investment and we are number one in the lowest amount of student debt. We continue to provide a great value here to students in the state of Tennessee.

Susan Henry asked when did he think Foster would be on down? The President said it would depend on how soon the state would allocate the funds. The earliest would probably be a year from now. Charles McClain asked what the number was for enrollment. The President replied official count is 9,810 students. We react to a lawsuit that the decline is not a multi-year decline.

Angie Denson asked if the Trailblazers could give prospective graduate students a tour and who would they reach out to? The President thought it was a great idea and that she could start by talking with Dr. Johnson. Keep in mind that the information that they typically would tell someone would be from the perspective of a current graduate student.

Charles commented on how pretty the campus has been looking with the landscape and wondered when we would be able to see the design for Peachtree? The President thought within the next couple of weeks. She added that everyone should get out to see the fall decorations on the plaza. The hals of hay were hand-painted.
