On your way to the Ed.S. Degree....

There are several points or responsibilities of which you should be aware as you move toward your projected graduation date. Please use the following checklist as a guide in helping you meet the requirements for your degree. The list appears in order of priority, except for some variation which may be caused by the status of your admission or which may be required by your Advisory Committee or by the Graduate School Office. Please do not hesitate to correspond with the Graduate School, Derryberry Hall, 931-372-3233, or your Advisory Committee in regards to these or other requirements. It is important that a student be in Full Standing and these requirements met in order to be eligible for graduation.

- 1. ____ Standardized Examinations. Admission to graduate study is conditioned by a requirement to take a standard examination before or during the first term of enrollment. Check the certificate of admission and confer with personnel in the Graduate School Office.
- 2. ____ Appointment of an Advisory Committee. Should be initiated during the term in which 9 semester hours will be completed.
- 3. _____ Reclassification. This step is necessary for any student who was admitted in Provisional Standing before admission to candidacy may be declared. Student must apply for reclassification by the completion of 15 graduate hours.
